Day	Activity
Monday	Watch and join in with the 'Daily Phonics' video on the school website. Write the <i>oi</i> and <i>er</i> digraph in your book (see example below). Ask a grown-up or older sibling to read the following words: <i>oil, flower, tinfoil, sister, jumper, join</i> . Segment the words and write them in your book under the correct digraph or trigraph. Choose one of the words and write a sentence with that word in <i>e.g. I spilt oil on my jumper.</i>
Tuesday	Watch and join in with the 'Daily Phonics' video on the school website. Today we are looking at the trigraph: <i>ear</i> . Look at the pictures below and write down a word to match each picture. Choose one of the words and write a sentence with that word in <i>e.g. The beard is brown and big.</i>
Wednesday	Watch and join in with the 'Daily Phonics' video on the school website. Today we are looking at the trigraph: <i>air</i> . Ask a grown-up or older sibling to read the following words: <i>air, fair, hair, pair, lair</i> . Segment the words and write them in your book. Choose one of the words and write a sentence with that word in <i>e.g. The girl had fair hair.</i>
Thursday	Watch and join in with the 'Daily Phonics' video on the school website. Today we are looking at the trigraph: <i>ure</i> . Ask a grown-up or older sibling to read the following words: <i>sure, lure, cure, manure, pure, secure</i> . Segment the words and write them in your book. Choose one of the words and write a sentence with that word in <i>e.g. I can smell some manure.</i>
Friday	Watch and join in with the 'Daily Phonics' video on the school website. Read all of your green tricky words. Spell them out loud using the letter names. In your book, try and write them down without looking at them.

Remember: When writing a sentence, have you got your capital letter, finger spaces and full stop?

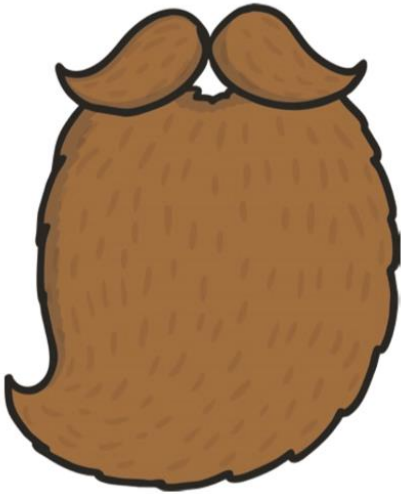
