Transcript for lesson 5

Your sentence has to be about The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch.

So, there's two little jobs on there: the first is to fill in the possessive apostrophes and the last job of the week is to try and write your very own sentence which includes a possessive apostrophe. So, let's have a look at the learning objective for today:

Learning objective

I can use possessive apostrophes correctly.

Success criteria

- 1) I can read sentences aloud correctly.
- 2) I can think about where the possessive apostrophe needs to go and add it into the sentence.
- 3) I can write my own sentence that includes a possessive apostrophe.
